# Carbon monoxide death

"Making toast is a normal act - you certainly don't expect to die from it," said the coroner at a recent inquest on the death of an East Finchley woman.

Her death was caused by a damaged gas cooker which produced a carbon monoxide buildup. It illustrates the importance of having gas appliances regularly serviced, writes Len Willcocks.

The coroner recorded a verdict of death by misadventure on 93-year-old Queenie Bowell of Creighton Avenue.

Police Sergeant, Richard Atkins, told the inquest, "There was a strong smell of gas. The grill was alight and the toast was burnt charcoal-black. Mrs Bowell was in the bedroom."

He was told that friends who used to look after Mrs Bowell would turn the gas off at the meter when they left her, but they sometimes forgot to do so.

The last time Mrs Bowell was seen alive was by a neighbour who put her to bed the night before.

A British Gas Manager who examined the cooker said, "The grill had incomplete burning caused by a fret that had become distorted, possibly by the

The flames touched one another which gives off soot, causing carbon monoxide to build up. It would have taken two hours for the carbon monoxide to build-up to a fatal level.

A level of 65 per cent of carbon monoxide was found in Mrs Bowell's blood. The fatal level is 50 per cent.
