# Playgroup faces closure

The numbers of children attending the outstanding East Finchley Playgroup are declining and recently have reached such a low level that its future is now in serious jeopardy.

The playgroup is a community organisation, established in 1972 and run by parents. It employs three fully trained and experienced staff, and children are encouraged to learn through play in a friendly, secure environment, giving them the necessary preparation for the school years ahead.

### **Child benefit**

Following the government's decision to place children as young as just three years old into the more formal school nurseries, the need for separate nurseries has declined, and Barnet Council have not seen fit to increase the playgroup's grant without changing its nature and working ethos.

However, many parents believe that at three years our children are just too young to be sent to nursery school, preferring the more informal and caring playgroup environment.

### Playtime's over?

But unless more children attend the East Finchley Playgroup soon, it will be forced to close. Therefore for all the parents in East Finchley with young children the message from their local playgroup is clear: either use it or lose it.

# **Bridge Over Troubles Walkers**

The bridge which carries the East End Road traffic over the Northern Line is notoriously narrow, with drivers having to be doubly cautious, especially when approached by the larger vehicles which try to thunder through. This situation is not helped by cars parking too close to the Budgen end of the bridge, where many a near miss occurs.

But Mrs Doris Jenkins of Beresford Road, East Finchley, is more concerned about the pedestrians who use this bridge. She cites the plight of old people who may be shaky on their feet or have mobility problems. They have to suffer vehicles brushing by them as they make their way along the pavement, which her husband Clifford has measured. One side at the Budgen end is 53-55 inches wide; the opposite side going the other way is 38-43 inches wide. As the average pram is 22 inches wide, imagine pushing one along there with a toddler or two by your side. Even worse, try doing the same thing with a double buggy! And

how does it affect people in wheelchairs?

### A bridge too far

Doris has written to local MP Rudi Vis, who contacted Barnet's Highway Department.

They say that the bridge is the property of London Underground Limited and that any consideration of road widening would have to be taken by them. However, Barnet is prepared to investigate the possibility of narrowing the carriageway! With contributing traffic from The Causeway and Deansway, this is surely a non-starter.

Clifford Jenkins' suggestion of getting rid of the pavement on one side, thus enabling

the opposite one to be widened, seems feasible. But that would raise the possibility of the need for some sort of pedestrian crossing nearby and we know how long that could take, judging by the lack of one (at the time of writing) in Fortis Green.
