NEWS IN BRIEF

Access to schools

Access to schools for young pupils who are disabled will be made easier thanks to a government grant of £100,000 for the borough's schools. The council will spend the money, which is part of the Access to Schools Initiative on improving 13 schools to make it easier and safer for young people to get around and play a full part in school life.

The flowerbeds outside Budgen's are to be upgraded. This means that they will be weeded by hand several times a year. In addition, they will be planted with evergreens in the autumn.

This was announced at the July meeting of the Finchley Forum, held in Hollickwood School, N10. The next meeting of the Forum will be in East Finchley. Watch out for details of where and when.

On yer bike

As part of the Council's efforts to encourage people to use more environmentally friendly forms of transport they have introduced a bike loans scheme. Designed to encourage staff to cycle to work, it will allow Barnet Council employees to borrow up to £300 over two years. (Rumours that the Mayor will travel by tandem are unfounded! Ed.)

East Finchley greening

East Finchley may well be greener this autumn. Last month's meeting of the Finchley and Golders Green Area **Environment Sub-Committee approved proposed tree** planting in Leslie Road. Councillor Alison Moore reported that our local Agenda 21 group is very enthusiastic about the borough's greening initiative, and is working closely with Tree Officers.

Some trees will be mature, some will be young ones grown in allotments, and others will be grown from seed.

The scheme, which is estimated at £14,000, will include guards and grilles.

Working together

The council and the police are to work together to combat crimes like domestic violence and racial harassment as part of a new Community Safety Strategy for Barnet.

Barnet Borough Superintendent and council". Simon Humphrey said that although joint initiatives had been successful in tackling car crime and burglary, crimes like domestic violence and racial harassment were being under reported.

He said that it was often council officers or other community representatives who first heard about such crimes and urged victims to come forward. He said that the police needed to reach victims in what he called 'hard to reach groups' and include them, adding that the sharing of information was crucial. Councillor Susette Palmer, Chair of the Community Development Policy Development Committee said "I urge all people suffering from this sort of crime to come forward and report it. I can assure them they will receive a sympa-

Although the Community Safety Strategy was already proving its worth, Cllr Palmer, stressed that there was no room for complacency and that there was much more that could be done.

One recent development has been the decision to re-introduce park-keepers in the borough's parks. The council is also committed to funding and installing CCTV systems in local shopping areas.

Cllr Palmer said that much had been achieved by council, police, probation service and others working together to combat crime and that more could be achieved in the future. "A safe, secure Barnet for the Millennium: there can be no more important vision than that", urged Cllr Palmer.
