Death watch

East Finchley resident, Mr Chapman, asked the Forum to investigate the

sorry situation of two trees outside All Saints Church, Durham Road. In 1997, he said, Church authorities asked the Council to remove a sycamore because of subsidence problems. The application was refused, and last year the tree appeared healthy and in full bloom. It is now dead. The leaves of a neighbouring tree (not a sycamore) are also turning yellow.

Mr Chapman complained that Barnet have not responded to his letters, and maintained that it would be simple to analyse samples from the trees to establish the cause of their sudden sickness. He wastold that a reply was in the post to him, and Chair Kathy McGuirk said that the Council would investigate and report back.

It was a rather soggy Saturday afternoon on 8 July when Councillor Alison Moore officially opened the new picnic and quiet area in Cherry Tree Wood, but this didn't dampen the sprits of those who attended, including Rudi Vis, MP, nor *The ChaChas* who provided the jazz music – even though they had to play close to the trees and required a volunteer to hold up an umbrella!

The opening was organised by the Friends of Cherry Tree Wood (FOCTW) and the Local Agenda 21 and timed to coincide with Barnet's Environment week and, most importantly, the provision of new picnic tables by the council. The organisers say they were more than a little alarmed when the tables had not arrived by the day before, but in the end the council managed to get three there for the opening.

The new area is between the café and the cottage at the far end of the park from the High Road where many years ago there used to be clock golf. The Countryside Management Services have advised on planting

for the area so that it will provide a reasonably secluded spot with six, very substantial - they need to be seen to be believed picnic tables in a woodland setting.

On the market

In spite of protests, North Finchley Market will be moving into Lodge Lane carpark. The Environmental Policy Development Sub-Committee has approved planning application for the market to use the south-east part of the carpark on Fridays, for a temporary period of two years.

Writer's cramp

About 10,000 square metres of graffiti have already been removed since April. A lot of it has gone straight back, but other authorities have reported that persistence pays. After their daubs have been cleaned off several times in succession, many of the vandals call it a day.

All racist or offensive graffiti should be removed from any property in the borough within twenty-four hours by the Council's specialised removal unit. Discussions are being held with Railtrack about defacement of bridges.

Culling all cars

Between 1 April and 17 July, more than 900 abandoned vehicles have been removed and disposed of. Where possible, the cost is passed on to the last recorded keeper. If the keeper has sold it on without informing DVLA, they will be prosecuted.
