# Fight Against Fraud Appeal

An appeal to all Barnet residents to help in the fight against benefit fraud has been made by council leader Alan Williams.

Launching a new hotline set up specifically for the public to report suspected fraudulent claims for benefit, Councillor Williams said: "Making a false claim for benefit is a crime and the council is stepping up its campaign against it.

"Fraud is not a victimless crime - we are all victims. Those guilty of making false claims for money they are not entitled to are costing each and every person in the community money, either directly in higher taxes or indirectly in the loss of much needed services.

"Each year benefit fraud costs money from all our pockets, money that could go to people in real need, money that should be invested in our community.

"It is time we all did all that we can to stamp it out. Call our hotline and help, it is your money and your services that are affected."

The new hotline, 8359 2007, is staffed from Monday to Friday by experienced staff who form part of a team specialising in dealing with suspected false claims. The line has an answering machine outside normal work hours.

All calls to the hotline will be treated in strictest confidence; callers do not even have to give their name.

Councillor Williams added, "I should emphasise that the council is not targeting the thousands of people who are genuinely claiming benefit. As part of our campaign we will be visiting all claimants and verifying their claims, but the genuine cases have nothing to fear.

"It is the small minority, who may be abusing the system, who are taking away resources from our community, who need to be fearful. Those who have will be prosecuted to the full extent of the law."

Barnet Council, in line with other local authorities, handles millions each year in payouts of housing and council tax benefit to those in need on behalf of itself and the Government. It is estimated that nationally £4 billion is falsely claimed in benefits.

Barnet is currently taking six individuals to court and prosecuting them for benefit fraud.
