Crime Diary

Woodland management

One recent Sunday found a small but intrepid band of miscellaneous locals collected in Cherry Tree Wood to be shown and have explained to them the rudiments of forestry management.

Lee Tyson, from Countryside Management Service, brought 30 baby English oaks only about 50cms high for planting following the removal of bastard Turkey oaks.

Apparently it was fashionable in Victorian times to bring back exotic flora to expand our native variety and sometimes they tended to take over too much.

The silty clay was found to be amazingly dry at quite a shallow depth and in some parts was impossible to dig. However by brew-up time all the little oaks were in their new abode and we moved on to clearing intrusive ash trees growing on the railway bank and suffocating creeping

Light programme

It is important that trees do not have to compete too hard for light, so we need to go back to traditional woodland practices since early man cleared the original wildwood from about 10,000 BC.

Otherwise all the trees would eventually die around the same time, leaving no seeds from living healthy trees to regenerate strong stock. The bird, butterfly and plant life would have died out from the darkness and blocking of wildlife corridors, making the wood a less interesting place.

So the embryo work started is to encourage health, diversity and wildlife, and the Friends of Cherry Tree Wood trust more people will join them on the next open day in February.

Mrs Jenkins holds the bridge

We know now that a lot of you are worried and frightened about crossing the East End Road railway bridge. Some of you have already asked Barnet Council to take some action - but without success.

A couple of months ago, we urged Archer readers to take local grievances to the Finchley Forum. The last Forum meeting was on November 30, and Mrs Doris Jenkins of Beresford Road did just that.

She pointed out the danger of a pavement as narrow as 38 inches, bordering an extremely busy carriageway.

But who owns the bridge?

How was anyone going to get anything done, she asked, when nobody would take responsibility for the bridge? Barnet Council told her it was owned by London Underground, while LUL insisted that it belonged to Barnet.

Barnet's Chief Traffic Engineer promised to discover the true owner. He told *THE ARCHER* that in similar situations LUL often owns the basic structure of a bridge, while the carriageway belongs to the Local Authority.

What action do we want?

Once these preliminaries have been sorted out, how do we feel the problem should be addressed? Please let us know.
