People in East Finchley are again being bothered by someone trying to cash in on their generosity. This time it is a man who, like the woman featured on the front page of last month's Archer, calls early in the morning or late at night. A resident of Summerlee Avenue tells of her encounter with him.

"One Sunday morning at 7.15am my doorbell rang. There was a man standing there whom I did not recognise. He asked me if I knew the lady who worked in Josephine's the florist. I said that I did. He said he was her son and that their van had been clamped in the High Road with £43,000 worth of flowers on board, he said they were short by £17 to pay for it to be unclamped.

I realised immediately that it was a trick. I know Trish and her son and this man certainly was not her son. I know they have not got a van and that there are no clamps in the High Road on Sunday mornings! I simply said 'We don't keep money in the house'. But he persisted, asking me if I realised who he was talking about. I said 'Everybody in East Finchley knows her and I still have no money!'. At which point he turned on his heel and walked quickly up the road.

Itelephoned the police immediately and reported the incident. Later I went to see Trish at Josephine's and told her.

Early Call

It seems that this same scam has been going on for months. This man had called on the priest of All Saints Church in Durham Road just 15 minutes before he knocked on my door."

There have also been reports of him in Temple Fortune and Hampstead Garden Suburb, claiming to have been sent by "the man who owns the greengrocers" or "Ralph from the flower stall" again asking for cash to get his van unclamped.

The man is white, medium height, aged between 30 and 40. He has light coloured hair and very round blue eyes. He speaks with a London accent. Do not give him any money and call the police.

Credit Union hits the spot

The Finchley Credit Union, launched in May last year, held its first Annual General Meeting at the Green Man Community Centre, East Finchley, on 3 March.

The credit union is a financial co-operative, run by volunteers, which offers a basic financial service for those who want to save a small amount regularly or wish to borrow at a low rate of interest.

The meeting heard from

Credit Union Chairman, Kim George, how the credit union had met its target of attracting 150 members in its first year, and had considerably exceeded its target with regard to savings.

"The credit union has been

successful because we are meeting a need, providing services to the otherwise financially excluded", he said. "But we have also been successful because even those able to gain finance elsewhere, realise our rates are very competitive"

Solitary Nature Reserve Under Threat

Local voluntary group, Coppets Wood Conservationists, is worried that Finchley & Friern Barnet's only public nature reserve is about to be systematically destroyed after 18 years of careful nurturing.

The Coppets Wood site is home to a number of rare and endangered plant species, which, it appears, Barnet Council are determined to eradicate, through path widening, application of weed killer and uprooting of plant life alongside many of the footpaths. Barnet gave the group ten days to identify the rare plants that would be affected by the work but has rejected the submissions made, and has written to the group notifying them that the work they do is no longer approved. Furthermore, it has ceased paying the groups expenses for work on the site, and for the educational work they do with local schools.

Dr. Oliver Natelson is outraged by these latest moves on the part of the Council, and is suspicious that this may be the pre-cursor of a plan to 'allow developers to move onto the site'. As evidence for this belief Dr. Natelson cites the recent tolerance of tipping on and around the site, the bulldozing of an ancient walk and hedge and the blocking of a vital wildlife corridor due to dumping.

The Archer has not been able to obtain a response from Barnet in time for this month's deadline; however, should you wish to find out more. we understand that Mr. Mark Evison, an officer of Barnet Council, is co-ordinating the Council's management of Coppets Wood.


