car park not a car park?

By John Dearing The open space behind Budgens has been used for some 30 years as a car park by shoppers, Viceroy Close residents and commuters.

According to the new owners it is designated as an access area by the council, not a car park, and residents have been informed of the need to alleviate congestion to allow access for deliveries. They intend to clear the dumped cars and commence clamping or ticketing "unauthorised vehicles" on 1 April (in time for the start of the CPZ).

Budgens (and presumably other shops in Viceroy Parade) will be able to buy permits for £500 from the new owners to hand out to their shoppers (so it is a car park, after all!). Only residents with "special needs" will get a permit. Iceland has a separate freehold and has its own parking spaces.

Despite the impression of the planning application, the proposed new flats will not apparently get parking spaces, "because the council will not allow parking spaces for one bedroom flats". So who will get the lion's share of the 22 spaces?

Demand from shops may increase with the CPZ and the new owners may expect to be able to sell permits for most of the spaces. For residents who own garages a welcome by-product of parking control could be an end to vehicles obstructing them. But will clamping be a sufficient threat?

Sy Wager uses computer software to scan in and digitally alter his images, by adding layers of textures and colour to create otherworld forms and landscapes.

These images, having been abstracted by many degrees from their origins, are no longer figurative. They have become refracted facets of eerily familiar alien topographies, illuminated by ethereal light. It is not immediately apparent if these are surface textures or multiple stratifications of immense

spatial depth. Wager's opus is reminiscent of fractal art, and yet these works, albeit rendered digitally, are honed in a painterly fashion. Sy is 31 years old and has lived in East Finchley for the last 22 years. He started using computers for designing his work in 1998, learning to use the software himself. Being more of a technical drawer and quite computer literate this was a very easy transition and he has been constantly amazed at the infinite possibilities. All the works on display were created between 1998 and 1999. The exhibition "FUSION-ISTIC ART" will be at Chorak 122 High Rd, East Finchley from 1 April to 31 May 2001.
