Now Church Farmhouse Museum on Hendon's Greyhound Hill is staging an exhibition on the story of magic, including tricks, magic props and historical material lent by well established and up and coming members of the Magic Circle and by Davenports, Britain's oldest established magic equipment manufacturer. Do you believe in magic? coincides with the publication of the book Magic Aid, which contains favourite tricks from magicians like Paul Daniels, David Berglas and Fay Presto. The book, which will be on sale at the museum and will raise money for children's charities, has been compiled by Hendon based conjurer and juggler Colin Francome. There will be demonstrations of magic at the museum during the exhibition which continues until 6 January 2002. Look out for leaflets and posters or contact the museum for details. Visitors to the museum from 6 December to 6 January 2002 will also get a chance to view the Christmas Past exhibition, in which the museum's 1850s Dining Room is decorated for a Victorian Christmas. Admission is free and the opening hours are Mon - Thur 10am - 12.30pm and 1.30 - 5pm; Sat 10am - 1pm and 2-5.30pm; Sun 2-5.30pm.
