A very successful Science Week involved pupils and their parents who joined in for a special Family Science evening.

The HTSA stall at East Finchley Community Festival raised £550. Other money raising ventures included non-uniform days, coffee afternoons, sponsored walks, a quiz and a Summer Barbecue, at which each child was given a coin commemorating the Golden Jubilee.

There was a fantastic response when children were asked to design a panel using the school colours. The sixteen most outstanding designs were made into panels to put on the pillars along the school fence. East Finchley Library agreed to hold an exhibition of all the impressive entries.

After Year 3's brilliant samba dancing down the High Road in the Festival parade, Year 4 were the next to dance in a Bollywood dance at the Barnet Schools Dance Festival, greatly impressing the audience by their performance and colourful costumes.

The junior choir delighted audiences at Barnet's annual multicultural exhibition.

Visits this term included Kew Gardens, the Natural History Museum, the English National Orchestra, the Globe Theatre and Whipsnade.

In school The London Mozart players performed a special concert for the children.

Year 6 put on a final show of music and comedy sketches with a topical flavour entitled "Fifty Glorious Years," celebrating not only their years at Martin Schools, but also the years of the Queen's reign. After the show the staff organised a disco to say farewell to the children.

Erik Chuan Ray Hu of Creighton Avenue has won a major prize in the London in Bloom Children's Painting Competition. Nineyear-old Erik, who is a Year 5 pupil at Holy Trinity School, submitted his work along with that of his classmates under the guidance of their teacher Andrea Hoath.

The competition is organised to promote an awareness of the contribution that trees, shrubs, plants and flowers make towards the enhancement of the environment, especially within school grounds. This year's theme was Plants You Can Eat. Erik's skilful picture of mushrooms led the field ahead of twelve runners up and 14 other winners.

In fact he won The Henry Dyson Fine Art Prize, where the artist is selected by and a special prize donated by Mr Henry Dyson of Henry Dyson Fine Art Ltd. and Fellow of Grey College, Durham University.

For his wonderful effort Erik received a certificate and a framed reproduction of his painting, along with an artist's manual.

School Children Rap up Street Crime

A group of pupils from Bishop Douglass RC High School demonstrated the full range of their musical talents on 19 July in the form of a rap to promote awareness of how best to avoid being the victim of mobile phone crime.

Pupils also visited communities and schools within the borough to test people's perceptions through a specially designed street crime survey.

The song is a fitting conclusion to a project carried out in collaboration with Barnet borough police and contains the key messages that the MPS has been voicing in the recent Safer Streets publicity campaign, where mobile phone crime was one of the main issues.

The main messages are to note your personal 15-digit IMEI number, to make full use of your pin code or security lock and to only use your phone in surroundings that you deem to be safe.

On message

In total, 550 people aged 11 upwards were surveyed; 293 male and 257 female. The

results showed 52 males and 102 females had been victims of street crime, however only 22 of the males and 57 of the females actually reported the incident to police.

Nearly three quarters of those surveyed owned mobile phones and many had reservations about using their phone in public.

Detective Chief Inspector Geoff Ervine of Barnet police said, "Barnet, like most other London boroughs, has in recent years experienced an increase in street crime involving a high percentage of youth victims and suspects. The opportunity of working with young people from Bishop Douglass School has proved to be very beneficial in allowing police to have a greater understanding of street crime and youth culture."

Best in Barnet Again
