# What the Local Traders Think

The Waitrose plans have not been submitted yet at the council and most people agree it is difficult to voice an opinion until they have seen them. But traders between Cherry Tree Woods and Baronsmere road, who will be affected directly, have expressed their initial views.

Mini-Cab station GLH, which started in 1968 and has an 18-year lease remaining, surprisingly refused a £200k offer. Managing Director John Scott, who is a member of the 'Warning on Waitrose' committee, said: "We are happy here and we would fight it all the way. From a social point of view we have a fleet with over 200 vehicles, currently employ over 50 people and, over time, provide a lot more employment than a supermarket. I've been here since 1969, and some of our workers have been here for 20 to 30 years of their lives."

### We cannot comment

It was more than a year ago that Waitrose approached Rennie and Partners, Chartered Surveyors on 26 High Road since 1979. But they were not contacted again and the business is now about to build an extension, which will double the business and has been approved by Barnet council. Proprietor Ian Rennie, said:

"My biggest concern is with the loss of seven residential units, and a lot of small businesses, in a borough which has an objective to provide 17,780 new houses by 2016 and already has a shortfall of 3,000; it just doesn't seem to make sense."

Waitrose has not yet contacted Travel Etc, at 22 High Road since 1997. Its proprietor said, "We are a growing business, we've just employed two new staff and are taking two new trainees next year. We would not want to move our business; we are based in the local community, and 80% is walk-in from this area, and commuters from the station. I don't know if we would survive elsewhere, and where would we go?"

A spokesman for Waitrose said they could not comment until planning is official and said, "We are interested in having a Waitrose in the East Finchley area but we cannot comment on specific issues at this stage."

# The Neighbourhood Watches

Residents living close to the proposed Waitrose site appear to be as divided in their opinions as is the rest of East Finchley, along with some "don't knows" and a few "don't cares".

Locals were alerted to the possibility by *The Archer* in September 2001 under the headline "Ripe for Development." In line with their policy of setting up cafes in parks, Barnet was inviting tenders for the disused pavilion in Cherry Tree Wood. Rumours linking the leasing of that building to Waitrose Stores and the setting up of a supermarket next to the park entrance were rife.

In December our article "Waitrose in the Wings" reported that Dr Rudi Vis, MP for Finchley and Golders Green, had told the AGM of The Friends of Cherry Tree Wood that he had seen plans for a Waitrose store on the site in question. At a subsequent meeting Colin (now Councillor) Rogers told the Friends that local Labour councillors had seen these informal plans.

It has taken a whole year for any plans to surface and be seen by those likely to be most affected by the development. Borough representatives, including those on Finchley Forum, have consistently parried all queries with the reply that as yet no formal planning application has been made. **Wow** 

But now a group of people have gathered to voice their own "Warning on Waitrose." Their concerns include the inevitable increase in traffic, congestion and pollution problems and the adverse effect on businesses in the High Road. Cherry Tree Wood could suffer and the East Finchley"village"feeling would be destroyed. Previous plans were said to include a Barnet Council drop-in centre and public toilets, and the suggestion of a large sum of money to improve the locale. WOW is worried that this has now been dropped in favour of a new library. Who knows what other changes might be made before any planning permission is sought?

Some supporters of the idea have prefaced their answer with, "I'm ashamed to admit it, but ...". Those in favour include older people who would find the flat walk to Waitrose easier; people with children who would have fewer roads to cross; teenagers looking for part-time jobs and those who feel that Waitrose offers a better range of products
