The Stayman Convention

Named, somewhat quixotically, after the American player George Rapee, the Stayman convention is a bid of Two Clubs after partner bids 1NT (some players also have the understanding that it applies after a 1NT overcall as well). It asks partner if he has a four card major; responses of Two Hearts and Two Spades show four cards in the bid suit, and a response of Two Diamonds denies a four card major.

It is important to remember that the convention can be used on both weak and strong hands. For example, holding ▲ 5432 ♥ 5432 ♦ 5432 ♣ 2 (to take an extreme case) you may well bid Two Clubs if partner opens 1NT and the next hand passes. Whatever partner bids, you intend to pass it. This may make it difficult for the opponents to enter the auction, as they may be uneasy about doubling without trump length. You may still go for 1100, of course, but such instances will be rare.

There is no harm on using Stayman on relatively balanced hands where your side has the balance of power. North-South got egg on their faces on this deal, from a local teams match:

South opened One Notrump, showing, at this vulnerability, 14-16 points, and West passed. North added his 14 points to his partners 14-16, and simply jumped to 3NT. West led the king

of spades, and there was r happy ending. South show good technique by duckir the first two rounds of spade but could not make nine tricl without playing on diamond West took his ace and cashed his spades for down one; 100 to East-West. If North had used Stayman South would have responded Two Hearts. North would have an easy raise to Four Hearts, and South would have made an easy eleven tricks - 650 to North-South. A swing of 750 points!
