The Phoenix Cinema decided to warm up the cold season by celebrating its four-months' refurbishment project, supported by Phoenix patrons Michael Palin, Victoria Wood and Mike Leigh, in a unique showcase of in-house talent. For a weekend the cinema had open house, and Phoenix staff entertained visitors with examples of their work.

Internal scenic painters, video artists, and interior design graduates were grateful for the opportunity to demonstrate their talents.

Screen International Award

Phoenix Manager Marcus Lloyd, known for his creative work outside the cinema, writes for stage, radio and TV, and in November he received an award by Emma Thompson for a Screen International's Scriptwriting Competition. General Manager Ruth Mulandi said, "We had short films, artwork and a TV drama, which was written by one of our staff. For our favourite screenings we took a vote, and we showed Blade Runner and Three Colours Blue?

Unique atmosphere

Vicky Tilson, one of the cinema's projectionists and a bass player, performed live with her Indie Rock band Sodium65. She said, "This weekend has been very well organised, it is an innovative idea, I don't know any other cinema that would celebrate a refurbishment in this way." Alice and Olly, two local video makers who documented the event for the cinema, remarked, "It's been really busy, in a way it's like a community centre here. Everyone seems to know each other, like one big happy family."

Anthony Janson, the front of house manager, was optimistic that this weekend demonstrated the Phoenix as an alternative for today's film lovers; "The atmosphere here does not have the feeling of multiplexes. The people that work here know about and care for films."

Spring Awakening

On Monday November 12 the cinema was handed over to the builders, after two years' of planning and fund-raising. The £220,000 project is being funded by a variety of individuals and organisations, such as an £85,000 lottery grant, the British Film Institute and Barnet Council. The renovation will leave the auditorium's character essentially untouched. Designed in 1910, The Phoenix is famous for its original interior and is the UK's longest continuously running cinema.

Plans include new education rooms and a café-bar, but a primary concern is to make the foyer and entrance accessible for the disabled. The cinema plans to reopen in the beginning of March.
