All Change at **Adamson Court?**

Occupants of Adamson Court, Hertford Road, have been told that it is no longer suitable as sheltered accommodation for the elderly. They are to be moved to alternative housing, but Barnet Council appears reluctant to make public their plans for the building.

Jill Howe of Durham Road has an 85 year-old aunt living in Adamson Court. She told THE ARCHER that they were informed by letter in July 2001 that Barnet had decided to update sheltered housing over the next ten years, which could entail her aunt and the other residents being moved to different accommodation.

Mrs Howe says, "We didn't think it would happen for years, and we heard nothing else until July of this year, when residents and their relatives were told that the 'decanting' process would begin in September."

Relatives say they had one week's notice for their appointment with the 'decanting' officer, who discusses needs and options for each resident.

What's the rush?

Jill and Peter Howe want to know why, "after such a long silence, when nothing happened, is everything being rushed through now?". They have referred the matter to Victor Lyon, Leader of the Council.

Residents of Hertford Road have also complained to Councillor Lyon and to Councillor Alison Moore. Ken and Sylvia Littlefield say they were told by a worker in the Housing Department that details were being finalised for use of Adamson Court probably as a hostel for the single homeless, but they could ascertain no further facts. They say that when they asked why such a prime site was not being kept for the elderly, they were told that there was insufficient demand for that category of accommodation. However, another source within the Council reportedly told them there were hundreds of the elderly requiring sheltered housing.

They continued, "We believe that Barnet Council have dealt with this matter in a very secretive and underhand way, completely ignoring local residents and any opinion they may have".

Other residents of Hertford and Bedford Roads are organising protests about what may be a controversial use of the building without prior local consultation

'One of the best supporting actresses of the Golden Age' - can East Finchley claim her?

"Binnie Barnes", said one admirer, "was more fun to be with than most of the leading ladies to whom she lost the man".

She played poker with Clark Gable and Zeppo Marx, was literally kicked on stage by Noel Coward, and ended up, aged 95, in a Beverly Hills mansion after starting from - where?

Local legend says Prospect Place, Holy Trinity school and a nursemaid's job in Muswell Hill. Binnie said Holloway and a milkmaid's job on a Kentish farm.

Her birth certificate confirms Holloway - Gertrude Maud (Gitelle came later), born to Rose and police constable William in 1903 at City Arms Buildings, North Road. Holy Trinity can be ruled out (I've checked their records), though as for Prospect Place - but we'll return to that.

After a spell of working in the Royal Northern Hospital, bed making lost its allure and she started flourishing a lariat in cabaret as 'Texas Binnie Barnes'. After that it was Cavalcade at Drury Lane, where she was so overcome by stage fright that Coward booted her on.

Film Fun

Moving to films, she often worked on two a day at Elstree. "I got sprayed with a bucket of water in An Old Spanish Custom

in the morning, and then had to run across the street to be glamorous as Catherine Howard in The Private Lives of Henry VIII in the afternoon." In between she squeezed in a brief marriage to art dealer Samuel Joseph.

Binnie's first US visit lasted one day. She came home because the Waldorf Towers shook, but - in 1934 - when 20th Century-Fox threatened to sue, she returned for good, marrying producer Mike Frankovitch in 1940.

The Thirties and Forties saw her trading quips with most of the vintage stars. Described as "stylish, sophisticated and sexy, adept at comic dialogue, but not afraid to do a pratfall to get a laugh", Binnie admitted that she never wanted the responsibility of playing the lead. "I never considered myself a big wheel. I just liked working. It was great fun."

The late Cyril Wilds remembers riding in her Cadillac in Times Square. Cyril said she was an East Finchley child, but I wonder whether she lived here in her twenties. The street directories of that time do show an Arthur Barnes in Prospect Place. Was that the connection?
