The Tarling Road "kitchen gardens and allotments" are run by the Vale Farm Horticultural Society.

In the last few years, the site has been reinvigorated and facilities are continually improving. Members grow a wide variety of vegetables, fruit trees, soft fruits and flowers in a pleasant and fertile environment. Plots are typically 125 or 250 square metres (5 or 10 poles) and rents start in the range of £10 - £17 per year

for 125 sq. metres Facilities onsite include

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flush toilets, water taps and troughs accessible to all plots, and composting facilities.
