From 18 July we are screening a film set in the heart of the French countryside: Summer Hours. It explores what to do with the belongings of a parent when divided between three children. The film is wonderfully French, full of sophisticated people, sexual tension and fine food and drink. That's why on Tuesday 22 July we're offering a wine tasting for anyone who buys a ticket to the 6.30pm screening. Artist Corrin Tulk will be displaying a series of new paintings in Chorak Café in Muswell Hill for the month of July and will show in Chorak Café, East Finchley, for the month of August.

Memory and flashbacks of seascapes and desert landscapes from the Margaret River region in Western Australia inform the work. Layers of information are scratched into the canvas and images are born out of familiar shapes.

The large canvases combine splashes of contrasting acrylic paint textures and shapes within a monochromatic palette. The abstract expressionist style incorpo-

rates cadmium reds, burnt sienna and red oxide on the one hand and ultramarine and cerulean blues on the other. The paintings are dreamlike and contain subtle shapes and light sources.

Corrin frequently visits South West Australia to supplement her photographic journal and then works from memory.

Four years ago Corrin studied for a degree in Illustration at Westminster University and

since then has exhibited regularly in London at art fairs and galleries. She also worked as a commercial interior designer in the City and West End for many years.

Review: Abigail's Party

Mike Leigh's farce of fantastic bad taste was played out to packed houses in Incognito's May offering of *Abigail's Party*. First performed in 1977, the play achieved notoriety when broadcast later the same year as part of the BBC series 'Play for Today.'

Beverly and Laurence, a couple with very different but equally laughable aspirations of 'genteelity', are entertaining new neighbours Tony and Angela. The real party (Abigail's) is going on elsewhere, and the pretence that begins in the title is played

out in hollow marriages, false neighbourliness and sham etiquette.

Incognito's wardrobe department had obviously had a field day and the set, dominated by hallmark 1970s brown and orange, perfectly evoked the banal, jaded nature of the characters' lives. The characters manage to be aimless yet antagonistic, preoccupied with themselves whilst failing spectacularly to connect with each other except in mutual irritation.

Beverly was played by Jackie Pearce, who dominated the stage in a purple crushed velvet dress with her overbearing presence, slightly raised voice, and outrageous comments. Her estate agent husband Laurence (Dan Kreeger) made a brilliant contrast with his gratingly earnest yet stubborn manner, and assumptions of superiority.

Dark comedy

As the evening unravels and the pretence of friendly hilarity turns sour, the couples start to act on their inclinations and discomfort turns into domestic violence. The silent 'Tone' (Michael Reece) reveals his essential belligerence, and Beverly her voracious sexual appetite. Sue, the sherry-drinking and socially superior divorcee, played with subtle vulnerability by Lesley Kennedy, has been force-fed gin and tonics, making her physically sick, while the victimised Angela, in Joey Timmins's entertaining portrayal, can no longer mask her husband's aggression.

The scene was always one of exaggerated spectacle in which the characters, though recognisable, are caricatures. But by the final (and by this time laughable) shock of Laurence's death, it has come to mean something more sinister too.

Director Peter Kenyon brought off another notable success for Incognito, and the packed auditorium was a tribute not just to the play's lasting popularity but also to his guidance and insight.
