East End Road rage

Traffic diversions on East End Road are giving grief to some East Finchley residents. Because the eastbound lane of East End Road is partly closed for gasworks until 30 November, the southbound 143 bus service has been diverted down Ossulton Way, reaching East Finchley station via Lyttelton Road and The Bishops Avenue.

Users of this service want to know why there was not enough advance publicity, why the exact diversionary route was not made clear, why disabled bus stops were not marked as such for a couple of days after the diversion started, why a temporary bus stop was not put at the top of Ossulton Way, and why the diversion is not down Deansway, as it is for cars.

Long journeys

Local resident Jean Gregory told us: "Since the closure of the sub post office, many elderly and/or disabled people have to collect their pensions from the East Finchley office. This can now mean two or even three buses, starting off in the opposite direction if they live between Ossulton Way and the High Road. If the diversion can't be down Deansway, at least a temporary bus stop at the top of Ossulton Way would be easier and safer."

Whose responsibility?

Transport for London is responsible for diversionary routing, publicity and bus stop siting, A spokesperson told THE ARCHER that, although it was too late in this case, these comments would be passed to their local area manager. He also said that their operations team would have consulted with Barnet Council. Barnet told us that buses were not diverted along Deansway because of restrictions caused by resident parking bays.

Drivers have also complained that there are no notices in the High Road warning that the right hand turn into East End Road from Market Place is blocked, and no advance notices for eastbound motorists in East End Road until Deansway itself.

The siting of these notices is the responsibility of contractors carrying out the roadworks, but local councils can ask for appropriate signs before making temporary traffic orders.

A spokesperson from Barnet Council said, "The council inspects the area regularly and will continue to do so throughout the lifespan of the works. If signage is found to be defective or positioned incorrectly, the council works with the utility companies to corrected the signage as a matter of urgency."

Local Café stays local The popular Local Café is moving from its long-time

home on the corner of the High Road and Lincoln Road to new premises close to the tube station.

The Local Café will take over the site formerly occupied by the Chez Nous restaurant. As we went to print, the café had reopened and was doing a roaring trade.

Run by Celal Ince and Niyazi Ozturk since 1991, the café employs nine people and is a focal point for the community. Sadly, Celal and Niyazi will not be making the move. They'll be handing over to new management but most of the café's staff will be on board again.

The move is happening because redevelopment plans

for properties in Lincoln Parade will mean some encroachment into the Lincoln Road premises. Two years ago, The Archer reported that this would have meant the Local Café having to move its kitchen and toilet facilities.

The lease on the Lincoln Road site has not been renewed so the café owners were pleased to be able to move their business further down the High Road where they hope their loyal customers, and many new ones, will bring them many more years of busy custom.

ing you all and cooking for you, which has given me the greatest pleasure, the Mandarin is closing its doors and I shall be moving on.


"I wish to thank you for your custom, support and friendliness. I shall miss the chatter and the stories we have shared.


