On Sunday 21 September, the Friends of Cherry Tree Wood held their AGM by the café, following last year's successful meeting there.

The main news was to report a Lottery grant to be used mainly for coppicing, new signage and protection of species, for which volunteers will be operating in the Wood from 29 October. Barnet's Green Spaces department is now back to strength. Picnic benches for the playground were due to be installed shortly and bins for recycling as well were requested.

The opportunity for questions revealed the usual problems, with the toilets having no supplies and the tennis courts deteriorating, with large puddles being formed. There was a suggestion to make the Wood an alcohol-free zone and for discussions to be opened with the Safer Neighbourhood Team before approaching Barnet about this.

An update from café owner Sally-Anne Wigfield on the proposals regarding the pavilion assured everybody that any new building would use the existing

bases, thus avoiding the need for heavy earth-moving equipment. The café needed to be in sight of the playground and, while deliveries would remain the same, there might need to be a personnel gate formed on the Brompton Grove boundary giving access just to the

Fears were expressed for the flowers of the old woodland where Barnet operatives had dumped a load of wood shavings and also about the bluebell area being replanted with daffodils, so more instruction was needed when unfamiliar tradesmen come into the Wood.

About 20 people apart from committee members attended. It was reported with regret that Chairman David Attfield was standingdown after sterling work, so any nominations for people willing to assist would be gratefully received.
