"The market wasn't sustainable, but I've not given up on this area." The words of Green Artisan organiser Wayne Atkinson, musing on the demise of his East Finchley's farmers' market.

Started last year in the playground of Martin Primary School, the market plunged from great expectations to frustration and closure. "It was just a decreasing circle," Wayne told THE ARCHER. "The producers were dropping out, even those who were doing well, like Two Fishwives." The many fans of that company will be sad to hear it has gone into liquidation.

However, Wayne remains convinced that things could have been different if he had been able to hold the market more frequently than once a month.

At present, Green Artisan is focused on possibly setting up a fortnightly Saturday market in King Alfred School at Golders Green. If this takes off, Wayne still has an eye on East Finchley.

Meanwhile, having helped organise the recent Slow Food exhibition on the South Bank, he was due to attend a worldwide food conference in Turin. Called Terra Madre, it brings together food from virtually every nation. "I can't wait to get out there," he says.
