The Phoenix of the opera

At the searing close of Richard Strauss's Salome two audiences applauded simultaneously, one in the huge New York Metropolitan Opera and the other in the Phoenix Cinema, where the first in a series of ten live satellite transmissions in HD was screened on Saturday 11 October.

To emphasise the immediacy of the experience we saw the orchestral players tuning up and singers greeting each other. Karita Mattila said she was about to sing "murderously difficult music over a massive orchestra." She grinned cheerfully, did some last-minute stretches and announced: "Let's kick ass!"

And we were off, plunged into the extraordinary HD experience. Picture colour and clarity were superb, with close-up shots forcing us into the intense relationships at Herod's court. The Dolby sound was at times almost overwhelming, but the focus remained on the singers throughout the performance, with no glimpse of the conductor, Patrick Summers, or orchestra.

Passion and decadence

It became clear why Mattila needed to be physically fit. Her Salome was a restless, needy (and cruel) spoilt child, constantly prowling, teasing and on the move, a disaster waiting to happen. Lacquered mother Herodias and leering stepfather Herod, finely sung by Kim Begley, completed this dysfunctional family.

From his dark prison below stage Jochanaan (John the Baptist) sung by Juha Uusitalo was winched up into the light at Salome's whim, and the confrontation leads to tragedy.

This short but sensational opera made a popular opener for the Phoenix New York Metropolitan Opera screenings. The next one is Doctor Atomic, by the contemporary composer John Adams, on Saturday 8 November. The Theatre Upstairs in the Gatehouse Pub in Highgate must be the highest theatre in London. Established for 10 years, it puts on a wide range of plays and musicals. Coming up in November is *Newly* by Wild Thyme Productions and, at Christmas, Sondheim's Into the Woods. And it will shortly be playing host to both the Hampstead Garden Opera with Donizetti and Garden Suburb Theatre with Breaking the Code.

Readers may have had the chance to catch the premiere of ATale of Two Cities: A New Musical, a delightful musical based on Dickens' novel and directed by actor Paul Nicholas.

It is many years since Paul Nicholas played the lead in TV's Just Good Friends, years in which he has starred in, produced and directed many successful West End plays and musicals. His collaborators on this musical, Steven David Horwich, David Soames and David Pomeranz have similarly impressive credentials in the business. And it shows.

A Tale of Two Cities had an

unbeatable plot, truly a tale of love, revenge and sacrifice. This was a concert version well suited to The Gatehouse's intimate space with just pianos and a minimal set, but memorable just the same. The cast, experienced and new, young and old, sang the tunes, charming and stirring by turns, with real feeling as the action switched from France to England and back again.

Surely we will see this great show on the West End stage before long.

North London Chorus perform their next concert this month in Highgate. The main work is Ein Deutsches Requiem by Brahms, who composed the work after the death of his mother. In spite of his sorrow, much of the work speaks of consolation and includes the well known How lovely is thy dwelling place. The choir will be performing this sublime work in the composer's own arrangement for two pianos.

The concert opens with Schubert's *Mass in G* (short and lively) when up-and-coming Royal College of Music tenor Richard Tyler will join the other soloists for this work. As a special treat, conductor Murray Hipkin will join the NLC Quartet in Elgar's Piano Quintet in A minor.

On Saturday 8 November we are broadcasting John Adam's *Doctor Atomic* from 6pm. Adams is a contemporary composer dealing with topical issues. This brilliantly staged production by director Penelope Woolcock is one of the highlights of the season.

Then on Saturday 22 November we have Le Damnation de Faust, directed by one of the most imaginative theatre directors currently working, Robert Lepage. Screening these operas gives The Phoenix another strand in our programme. We believe that we should always endeavour to bring cultural screenings of the highest order and the New York Met opera certainly fits well with this philosophy.

We are of course also showing films in November, with two main features this month. From Friday 7 November there is the new film from Agnes Jaoui called Let's Talk about the Rain. Those of you who saw Comme *Un Image* will know that Jaoui is an intelligent and questioning filmmaker whose work deserves to be seen.

The second main feature in November is Waltz with Bashir.

Some of you may already have had the pleasure of seeing this in our London Film Festival screening. It's an exceptional film, an animated documentary on the Lebanon war of the early 80s. It does what film does best: make a difficult subject accessible and understandable without ignoring the complexities of the situation. It's one that I'm very much looking forward to.

Amongst the many double bills this month, one that's worth a special mention is *Unrelated* and *Under the Skin* on Sunday 16 November. We're delighted to have the director of Unrelated for a talk between the two films. *Unrelated* is an impressive debut about relationships across an age gap and an interesting film to accompany.
