### Beijing Games from the inside

John Reardon, of Springcroft Avenue, was in the midst of the excitement of the Paralympic Games in Beijing. Here he recalls this unforgettable experience.

As an avid sports fan, I enthusiastically followed the Olympics this summer, and when presented with the opportunity to travel to Beijing for the Paralympics, I couldn't have packed my bags more quickly.

After the success of the Olympics, I was excited to see what the Paralympics had in store. I went to Beijing to attend the British Council's Young Advocate Programme, a forum that promotes intercultural dialogue, social inclusion and the development of civil society. 240 advocates from around the world, including 120 young people from China and Hong Kong, 100 from the UK and 20 from other countries, divided equally between able-bodied and disabled 18-23 year-olds, joined together on 4 September in Beijing.

The primary aim of our project is to develop the Paralympic spirit by boosting awareness of the Paralympics and disabled sport across the world. We attended the games on several occasions, dressed head to toe in the British colours and chanting the national anthem, but most of our activities were in the Chinese disabled training camp where we were staying.

#### Talents revealed

Together, all the participants attended a variety of workshops aimed at enhancing the confidence, leadership and communication skills of Young Advocates to help us contribute positively in our local communities.

I personally attended a workshop held by the Northern Ballet theatre. Once I'd got into the swing of things and learnt how to boogie, I noticed how well everyone in the group had adapted to the challenge. It was remarkable to see able bodied and disabled people working together to form a piece of art, showing off the talents every one of us possesses, and after the final performance I don't think there was a dry eye in the house.

#### **Inspiring**

The opportunity to go to Beijing had a profound impact on me, bringing home the concerns of many disabled people, and how unrepresented some of them feel. I was inspired and empowered by all of the Young Advocates, who are so keen to promote the disabled cause. For me, the Paralympics in Beijing this summer was a tremendous success and so many positives can be drawn from the games and taken to London in 2012.
