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Stab victim escapes by bus

By Janet Maitland A 19-year-old man escaped by bus after being attacked and stabbed at Tally Ho Corner in North Finchley on 24 May.

The victim had been travelling on the 263 bus. As he was getting off at the stop outside the Aldi at about 5pm three young men on the lower deck barged past him. When he told them to 'relax' they followed him off the bus threatening him.

One of them grabbed him round the back of the neck and stabbed him in the upper right side of his chest, while another man kneed him in the back and ribs. The men then made off down the High Road heading south.

The victim got on another bus to escape, getting off at the stop opposite Oak Lane in East Finchley, where he called for help.

He was found to have two stab wounds. His condition was declared not life changing or threatening, however, and he was able to leave hospital at 3am after treatment.

The suspected attackers are described as black and between 18 and 20 years old. One was wearing a dark blue T-shirt and three-quarter-length trousers and carrying a black shopping bag. One wore a white T-shirt and cream combat trousers. The third man wore blue jeans and a white T-shirt. If you have any information about this crime, please contact Barnet police on 0300 123 1212. Vigilant neighbours can be lifesavers

Thanks to a caring neighbour, the life of an elderly resident was saved in May. Anne Haike, who lives at Prospect Ring, contacted us because she hadn't seen her neighbour for about two weeks. PCSO Jan Lovell and I made enquiries with other neighbours, none of whom had seen her recently.

Fearing for her safety, I made a forced entry to her flat, and found her on the floor in the corridor in a very poor state physically and mentally. An ambulance took her to hospital where she is still recovering.

It's thanks to Anne that her neighbour, who has no friends or next of kin, was able to get the medical help which undoubtedly saved her life.

Shielding the vulnerable

Last autumn we set up the Shield Project, which focuses on elderly and vulnerable people in the community. We keep a database of vulnerable people and visit them regularly to prevent crime and check on welfare. It is nearly always the more isolated elderly and disabled people who need the most help



and it is worth thinking about any neighbour you might have in this position.

An elderly person can go downhill quickly at any time of year, not just in the winter. Let us know if you want us to add someone to the database. If you have immediate concerns about someone, always contact the police.

We've also set up a new initiative called E-WATCH, which will alert you if an incident such as burglary or vehicle crime has happened on your street or very nearby. An added bonus is that a resident or business can use E-WATCH to feed back to us anything you think we should be aware of.

We now have many email addresses from residents right across the ward. We will call on all residents, giving X Marks the Spot cards and offering to take email addresses to add to our list. This will take some time, so don't wait for us to call: send us your email address, your home address and your name. The addresses will be filed under street name and will be used only to get in touch with you; they will not be passed to any third party.
