Bikes give officers the surprise factor

Mo Kassar is one of the officers from our Safer Neighbourhood Team who have taken to two wheels to patrol the area. He was snapped by Martin Addison while doing school duty outside Holy Trinity School, where he also teaches road safety to primary school children.

"Bicycles increase our visibility and our responsiveness. We can get to where we need to be more quickly," said Sergeant Andy Matthews. "We can also now cover large areas such as St Pancras and Islington Cemetery, where there have been several car thefts recently. Most of the team have now been trained and issued with a special cycle uniform.'

Another benefit of using bikes has been the impact on arrests. "We've made a number of arrests where we effectively 'surprised' offenders, who were used to us patrolling on foot," said Sergeant Matthews.

petrol thefts

By Janet Maitland A spate of petrol thefts has led to the Esso garage on the High Road taking extra precautions to prevent customers driving off without paying. There are now signs on the pumps warning customers that they will be delayed while car details are taken.

"Each vehicle and occupant are now scrutinised,' said Sergeant Andy Matthews from the Safer Neighbourhood Team. "The registration mark and a description of the occupant are noted and a detailed CCTV image captured. Any 'drive-offs' are reported to the police and are fully investigated."

'Sometimes people don't pay because they're in a stolen car," said a garage source, who preferred not to be named. "But a lot of people are just opportunists. They see there's a queue at the cash desk, and take a chance on driving away."

A police spokesperson said that the garage was under new management and that staff were much better at recording information. He said: "The new management are hot on the case and are doing everything in their power to put a stop to the thefts. Once we're notified of a drive-off, we go to the address of the car owner. It happens sometimes that people have just forgotten and they pay up immediately, very embarrassed."

Alert over | Act now to get the library you want

We have until the end of this month to tell Barnet what we want from our library service. Cuts and alterations in service throughout the borough are inevitable, and the Council have said that residents' surveys will play a key part in their decision-making. However, there were no paper survey forms for their review available in libraries until the end of October.

This was deliberate policy. When THE ARCHER asked Barnet why no forms were available for virtually the whole of last month, we were told that the delay was to avoid a clash with questionnaires on display relating to a statutory national survey into services for the young.

A council spokesperson said: "BarnetCouncil did not want any confusion between the two surveys, or anyone who completed the national survey to think that they had already completed the council survey into the future of our library services.'

We asked why staff in more

than one library appeared not to know anything about this. One library user was told that they had been expecting the forms since the beginning of October. Barnet replied that all staff had been briefed.
