Not many people would associate a cinema with live radio broadcasting, but that is what an almost-full **Phoenix Cinema witnessed** on 27 May when the award-winning Kermode and Mavo's Film Review was broadcast from the cinema.

The BBC Radio Five Live show, featuring presenter Simon Mayo and film critic Mark Kermode, has been on the air for ten years and this broadcast was part of their anniversary celebrations.

One of this country's leading film critics, Dr Kermode is a patron of the Phoenix. During the broadcast, he was lavish in his praise of East Finchley's cinema, which celebrated its centenary last year and is one of the oldest purpose-built cinemas in the country. He describes it as "the cinema I grew up in", elaborating that "I saw every single significant film of my adolescence in this cinema."

The audience, who had come from all over the country, were treated to a live version of the show, including several of Kermode's impersonations of film stars, an interview with actordirector Noel Clarke and one of Kermode's trademark rants about the recently-released The Hangover: Part II.

Audience participation is a key feature of this and many other programmes on Radio Five Live, often by inviting listeners to text or email the presenters, and with a live audience this came by way of Mayo inviting people who had seen current movies to offer their opinions.

The highlight for many of those present was discovering that one couple were attending the broadcast as a first date, a fact only revealed when a man in the audience called Grant texted a movie-related opinion to the show. His date modestly refused to be named on national radio.

Short films make it big

The Phoenix Cinema played host in May to the return of Short Cinema, a festival of short films organised by Martyn Gilbert and Zahil Akram. Film makers and enthusiasts who are passionate about making shorts more accessible to regular filmgoers, they worked with London College of Fashion students and other independent film makers to produce this year's screenings. Films were submitted in answer to their online publicity from as far away as India.

The Phoenix was chosen as the venue for its importance as the oldest continuously operating cinema in the UK. The premieres were well attended by students, film makers, friends and families and the whole event was a really enjoyable occasion for all.

After the screening of the films a social networking event was held in the Bald Faced Stag to give everyone involved a chance to meet, exchange views and make new contacts. An online forum is planned for shortfilm makers.

Gilbert and Akram's spooky film Winding Wood Drive can be seen on their website www.windingwooddrive.co.uk and it's well worth a visit. It was their experience of trying to get this screened that prompted them to set up Short Cinema. They found that submitting to film festivals does not guarantee a screening and there is an entry charge to film makers, albeit with the lure of winning a prize.

Cleveland Street: The Musical

I took my seat in the theatre aptly named "Above the Stag", for it is above the friendly, West End boozer of that name, to the chatter of Victorian London. The actors of Cleveland Street: The Musical, directed by Highgate's Tim McArthur, sat in character on the small, intimate stage, exchanging the latest salacious gossip from the notorious homosexual brothel of that address.

Transported back in time, I listened to the musings of lively telegraph boys, gay aristocrats, a Scotland Yard detective and a saucy "Madame". The set was reminiscent of a plush Victorian parlour, the very essence, or at least veneer, of respectability.

The drama opened with a song, one of many engaging numbers in a rollicking score, delivered with humour and conviction. With a versatile set, the parlour was transformed into

a Post Office sorting room, a boudoir and, memorably, a horse and carriage (complete with clipclopping sound effects).

The three live musicians, a flautist, pianist and cellist, blended harmoniously and provided a stimulating accompaniment to the play. Many actors had several parts and they pulled off their multiple characterisation with aplomb. All were notable for their high standard of performance.

At times the small stage felt crowded, especially when the protagonists were in full flight with dance and song, but professionalism shone through. Risque moments, of which there were several, were balanced to avoid alienating the audience. Tim McArthur (THE ARCHER, May 2011) had promised upbeat, bawdy entertainment and the cast duly delivered a wickedly entertaining tale of sex, lies, hypocrisy and cover-ups.
