Residents braced for impact of new flats

"A village of colourful character, fine restaurants and modern convenience. Step into a cosmopolitan new lifestyle that exudes the finer qualities of luxurious living - N2 London has it all." So runs the opening line on an international estate agency's website extolling the virtues of East Finchley in general, and the flats in the new property development on Lankaster Gardens in particular.

The development is called Archer Gardens, named after the landmark statue on the Tube station. Building work started in November 2009 and was completed in August of this year, at a total cost of £26million.

Archer Gardens is a modernlooking apartment block that consists of 105 residential spaces, including 32 general need units, 20 shared ownership flats and 53 properties for outright sale, of which three had been sold at time of going to press. Secure underground parking, one place per flat, is provided.

Addressing local issues

Local residents' concerns about the building process have been taken into account. For instance, the new development is no higher than the existing houses, answering concerns raised by residents during the planning permission stage. "We were concerned about the height but they reduced it when we all complained," explained Lankaster Gardens resident Jessica Wyman.

Concerns about the impact on

the local infrastructure and how Barnet Council will respond continue to be expressed. "We're wondering what will happen when they're all sold," said John Lucas, also of Lankaster Gardens. "What will Council do about the schools? There's huge pressure on school places in this area already."

During the consultation period, residents of Lankaster Gardens and Chambers Gardens expressed concerns about the impact on their streets of increased traffic and further pressure on street parking.

Those anxieties are still keenly felt, but it would seem that the full impact of the new development on East Finchley will only become apparent once most or all of the flats are occupied.

The organisation behind the development is One Housing Group (OHG), a housing association that receives funding from the Government to provide affordable housing. OHG has been responsible for many recent developments in Greater London and the Home Counties.
