We use free postal services to distribute the CDs and we have enjoyed a beneficial lease from the Borough on our studio. For all other expenses such as electricity, stationery, maintenance, CDs and equipment, BBTN relies on the generosity of its Friends and other donors.

Some of the rioting in August reached Muswell Hill, where two shops were damaged. Panoptica, the opticians, came off worst, with a bill for approximately £9,000, when thieves smashed windows and looted designer frames.

The following day, windows at Carphone Warehouse were broken, but an arrest was made.

Muswell Hill and Fortis Green Association Chairman, John Hajdu, said: "These disturbances have taken us all aback. It is almost unimaginable that this should be happening here, (but) it is reassuring to note that our local police teams were so effective in dispelling any further trouble in this area.'
