The man behind the inkblot

You can still find Finchley schoolchildren writing with quill pens. Just a stone's throw away are mounds of earth believed to be diggings from the construction of the Edgware line. The scene is the Stephens Collection, established by The Finchley Society and lodged in Avenue House.

Those mounds of earth are picturesque little hills in arguably the most attractive park in Finchley. They were landscaped by Henry "Inky" Stephens, once MP for Hornsey and Finchley, who bequeathed Avenue House and its grounds to the people of Finchley in 1918.

Henry experimented with writing fluids, but it was his father Dr Henry Charles Stephens who invented the blue-black ink which bears their name.

In the days before ballpoint pens and computers, Stephens Ink with its inkblot trademark was as famous (and much more necessary) throughout the world as Coca Cola is today. Even now it is still irreplaceable as a marking and endorsing ink.

A visit to the Stephens Collection is fascinating. Curator Stewart Wild has tracked down memorabilia from all round the globe. And don't just concentrate on the museum room. Look around the foyer and hall in Avenue House and you may be surprised at what you find.

Three student friends

It is also well worth reading a new book. It's called John Keats, Henry Stephens and George Wilson Mackereth, The unparallel lives of three medical students, and yes, it is referring to the John Keats. In old age, Stephens wrote

an informative memoir about the poet. Keats died young, and only the third friend, George Mackereth, practised medicine all his life. Eventually his daughter married Henry's son, the "Inky" who bought Avenue House.

Henry is buried in St Marylebone Cemetery in East End Road, near the bridge over the North Circular.

the world of Japanese art, especially antiques and contemporary crafts. She lives with her husband Hartmut in Durham Road. Daughter Kaoruko is doing her A levels at Fortismere and next year hopes to do an Art Foundation course (like mother like daughter!) at the London College of Communication. Younger sister Karin is very happy at Coldfall Primary School.

Kyoko's passion for traditional Japanese art started at University where she immersed herself in the history and ceremony of the Japanese tea culture. Later, in Italy and Germany, as a modern Japanese woman she started to think more deeply about her cultural background and met experts from the art world.

Pottery experts recognise the strong historical ties between Japan and the United Kingdom in this field. For example, the famous English potter Bernard Leach lived and worked in Japan for many years and was greatly influenced by Japanese ceramics. A vast range of Japanese art works now exists in the United Kingdom, notably in the British Museum and V & A Museum, but also in many regional museums and private collections.

Kyoko Kuga now has a showcase at Gray's antique market near Bond Street tube station and there will be an opportunity to see Kyoko's antiques and artworks at the Alexandra Palace antique fair on 18 September. The beautiful objects she collects and sells can be seen on her website: www.gallerykuga.com. At present, 10% of every sale is being donated to the Japan Red Cross.
