Anyone recognise our four-pawed friend?



Every tiger matters

Normally home to tennis players and gym users, the David Lloyd Club in North Finchley was the venue for an uplifting event to raise awareness and cash to save the world's tigers.

A number of wildlife charities came together to spread the word about this critically endangered species, whose numbers have dropped to an estimated 3,000 to 5,000 left in the wild.

Organisers Emma and Martin Leuw, of Tiger Awareness, made sure it was an enjoyable evening with a fancy dress theme, a three-course meal and live entertainment.

Guest speakers John Rendall, who hand-raised a lion cub called Christian after buying him in the pet section at Harrods

in 1969, told of the threat from poachers, who sell tiger body parts to the medicine trade in the east. John also warned that, as tiger numbers dwindle, poachers are turning their attention to lions and other large cats.

Phil Davis, also from Tiger Awareness, said the charity's mission statement was to work with local communities and to support forest staff to keep tigers wild and conserve their habitat. This event raised more than £5,000 to fund that work. Find out more at www.tigerawareness.co.uk.
