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Community garden dream comes true

The new Octavia Hill Community Garden was officially opened by the new Mayor of Barnet, Cllr David Longstaff, on Bank Holiday Monday 30 May. The garden, which is next to the Green Man Community Centre in Strawberry Vale, will become a real asset for the neighbourhood and complement the centre's activities.

The garden is the result of collaboration between Peabody, which manages housing in Strawberry Vale, and the Green Man Management Group. It commemorates Octavia Hill, a Victorian social housing pioneer and contemporary of George Peabody, founder of the Peabody Trust.

Along the garden path

In 2004 local residents were concerned about the future of the piece of rough land adjacent to the Green Man Centre, which had been used as a site compound for some major works on the estate. They approached Peabody for permission to create a garden.

The initial plan featured a lot of hand-cut stonework and was rejected by residents as too costly. Soil reports also showed slightly elevated levels of arsenic in the ground, thought to be related to the centuries-old metalwork found at the site.

Years earlier, when the foundations for the Green Man Centre were being dug, bits of metalwork including horse shoes were uncovered. With help from *THE ARCHER* we discovered that the site had previously contained an outhouse, probably a smithy, at the back of the Green Man Pub. The smithy would have looked after the horses when the Green Man was a coaching inn on the road into and out of London.

Oasis of green space

The toxicity in the soil needed to be addressed, adding

another considerable cost. The Green Man Management Group was determined to see the garden delivered so new plans were developed and Peabody's asset management team was able to contribute additional resources to make the garden a reality. Both the Green Man Management Group and Peabody contributed about £65,000 each to the project.

Jan Kerr, chair of the Green Man Management Group, said: "It is so wonderful to see the garden finally open for local people to enjoy. Octavia Hill would have been delighted to see this little oasis of green space created."

Woman on crutch robbed in broad daylight

Police are appealing for
information after a disabled woman in her 80s
was attacked and robbed
in the street. The woman
was using a crutch to walk
along Thomas More Way
at about 3pm on 1 March
when a man pulled her to
the ground and snatched
her handbag.

A passer-by who saw her lying on the pavement rushed to help her, thinking that she'd fallen over. She told him she'd been robbed and pointed to the suspect who was getting into the driver's seat of a grey Volkswagen Golf parked nearby.

He is described as about 5ft 6ins tall, of slim build, wearing a tight black woolly hat, grey/black jumper and khaki-coloured trousers. Police say he drove off, turning left into East End Road. The woman was taken to a north London hospital with injuries to her face and knee.

Police say the victim had just been to the bank to withdraw money for a holiday. It is not known if the robbery was random or if she had been noticed in the bank and then followed.

Human error caused chaos at the polls

Human error caused the wrong voting lists to be released ahead of the London Assembly and Mayoral elections on 5 May, preventing hundreds of people in Barnet from casting their vote, a report has found.

Independent investigator Mark Heath was called in to find out what went wrong and to set recommendations for action before polling stations opened again for the Referendum on 23 June.

Among his recommendations were a complete review of procedures by Xpress, the company responsible for distributing the voting lists on behalf of Barnet Council, and an undertaking to release the lists a day earlier to allow time for checking ahead of a poll opening.

As we reported last month, scores of voters in East Finchley and across the borough were turned away from polling stations because their names weren't on the list, even though some of them had polling cards with them. Those who were able to return later in the day found they could then vote.

Mr Heath, the Returning Officer for Southampton, estimated from the number of complaints that hundreds rather than thousands of voters were affected on the day.

Other recommendations

He called for a more robust checking process at all stages of the electoral system and for adequate staff to be employed to make the checks. Communication between polling station inspectors and the election office needed to be better and a public helpline with a minimum of 10 telephone agents, not an answerphone service, needed to be in operation throughout voting hours.

Mr Heath also recommended that Xpress should communicate the problem in Barnet and the measures taken to rectify it to all other counting officers across the country.
