London tale: Author Sarah Elizabeth Beaumont has updated Alice's Adventures in Wonderland

Alice's adventures in... north London!

Anyone who dropped into the storytelling tent at the East Finchley Festival in Cherry Tree Wood may have heard London author and artist Sarah Elizabeth Beaumont reading from her modern version of a well-loved classic.

Sarah has written and illustrated 'Alice's London Adventures in Wonderland', which follows Lewis Carroll's young heroine through the streets and underground tunnels of modern-day London.

In her light-hearted retelling, Alice's journey incorporates 119 famous London landmarks including Harrods, The Shard, Tower Bridge, The Globe Theatre and St Paul's Cathedral.

Her pen-and-ink illustrations are a homage to the originals by Sir John Tenniel. In her book, she shows Alice playing with a royal corgi in front of Buckingham Palace, swimming with a mouse in Trafalgar Square, and talking with the Cheshire Cat in Camden.

From receiving her first pop-up book as a child, Sarah has been fascinated by Alice in Wonderland. She is a fine art and music graduate who edited international journals for trade and industry throughout the 1990s and has written training materials for education. This is her first published work of fiction.
