Music maestro steps down at All Saints' By Ken Carter

When the East Finchley Arts Festival takes place this October at All Saints' Church in Durham Road, we can expect a man of several years, black-suited, to tell audience members nightly of escape routes... in case of fire. We will see him mingling genially with concertgoers during the interval and then conducting singers and instrumentalists. Who is he?

Geoffrey Hanson has been Director of Music at the church for just short of 30 years. Now, alas, he has announced his retirement from the post although happily not from his role in organising the Arts Festival, which he founded in 1997.

Geoffrey has been the driving force behind everything musical at All Saints since 1987. He is a distinguished composer and organist in his own right. I have heard his Piano Concerto no. 2, his Ode to Saint Cecilia (with text by local poet Fleur Adcock); his Odyssey for Cello and Strings, a wickedly impish 'Orpheus', a brazen trumpet concerto and a cheeky concerto for saxophone. In 1962, he founded the London Ripieno Society, a choral group that is still going strong and whose purpose is to give public performances

of lesser-heard and unexplored works from the repertoire.

With the Arts Festival he has annually brought something outstanding of his past to enrich our East Finchley present.

Regularly, we hear the London Mozart Players, with whom he has had a longstanding association. This distinguished chamber orchestra, founded by Harry Blech, introduced London to crisp, sprightly Mozart and Haydn.

Geoffrey has scoured elsewhere for lively talent: the children's choir from All Saints', first recitals from local youngsters, the Pop-Up Opera whose clutch of superb young singers and a talented pianist give us uproarious fun in Donizetti and Mozart.

Take care of yourself, Geoffrey, as you relinquish one of your roles. So many of us are in your debt.
