Beacon Lodge is demolished

Beacon Lodge in Eastern Road, N2, once home to an organisation that supported young mothers with complex problems, has been demolished.

The service was forced to shut in July 2014 after cuts to social care budgets at Haringey Council drained it of financial support. The property was put up for sale and is now in the process of redevelopment.

Beacon Lodge started life as a home for unmarried mothers, finding adoptive parents for their babies or supporting those who wished to keep their children. Since the 1970s it had been a hostel for young mothers where they were given help by qualified social workers.

A statement from Beacon Lodge Charitable Trust at the time of closure said: "The work of Beacon Lodge will not end with this, but change yet again. The proceeds [of the building sale] will be used to continue the care and protection of the welfare of children by the support, assistance and provision of education to their parents."

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The Eastern Road property was originally bought by Florence and James Bradley in memory of their only son James, a 2nd lieutenant with the Royal Sussex Regiment who died after being wounded in action on the front line in France in October 1918.

They donated it to the work of the trust in 1928 and a plaque commemorating their son and his portrait hung in the entrance hall. These memorials are now housed safely in All Saints' Church in Durham Road (*THE ARCHER* December 2014).
