A red-haired boy

There have been several incidents of egg throwing at properties in Trinity Road, Manor Park Road and Church Lane. A distinctive boy was seen running away from two of the properties. The same boy was also seen by the Trinity Road/Manor Park Road underpass where he was trying to throw traffic bollards over the chain fencing on to the Northern line track. This is clearly incredibly dangerous and we want to speak to this boy and his parents.

The boy is 11-14 years and has short straight bright ginger hair and is well spoken. The suggestion is that this boy and a brown haired friend of a similar age are very local. If you think you may know who these boys are or where they live, please contact us or call 101.

Phone scams

Here is a very recent example of how phone call scams can work. Fortunately in this instance the victim realised something was wrong before handing over any private financial information.

The caller identified herself as Amalia and said she was a BT operator. The victim stated that the caller spoke with an Indian accent and the line sounded like it was a long distance call.

Amalia said there was an issue with the victim's computer and asked him to do some trouble shooting. He complied and shortly after doing these steps she informed him that there had been fraudulent activity on his BT account and asked him to get his bank statement to see if there were any extra charges from BT.

When the victim returned to the phone Amalia asked for the account number of the account along with the 16-digit card number and also the three-digit security number on the reverse of the card. He became concerned, remembering that he shouldn't hand these details over to anyone on the phone.

When he refused to give these details, Amalia started getting aggressive, saying that without them she would inform the Police and they would arrest the victim the following day. Amalia then "transferred" the call to the Met Police in MANCHESTER. When the victim stated that the Met Police are only in London, a male with an Indian accent came on claiming to be 'Sgt Michael' and demanding details for the bank account. At this point the victim hung up.
