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How football made my brother talk again

Dhanu Tailor, who works at the CW Andrew Pharmacy, 32 High Road, proudly told The Archer about her daughter Manisha who was awarded the MBE in the New Year's Honours List for 'services to football and diversity in sport'. They do not yet know when and where the presentation will take place, but the story behind the award is compelling.

Manisha taught in primary schools for over a decade. She was preparing to become a headteacher when family circumstances caused her to choose a change of career. Her mother had undergone triple by-pass surgery, her sister had moved out to university and her twin brother was in need of one-to-one care.

Breaking the silence

Manisha has always been devoted to her brother. Sadly, at the age of 18, he had succumbed to depression and other mental health issues believed to have been brought about by bullying at school, and he stopped speaking.

But a breakthrough was to come from an unexpected quarter. During her teaching career Manisha had pioneered football amongst Asian children and nad run school football clubs with both mixed and girls' teams from different ethnic backgrounds, achieving success in local leagues.

During this time, her brother recognised her football kit and said: "Football... Manisha." He had not spoken for almost 15 years.

Football was our love and passion since childhood," says Manisha, "So I instantly decided to make a career in football work with the view of aiding his recovery, but also helping others in a similar situation."

Changing lives

To this end she has worked with the provision of weekly football sessions at the Wingate and Finchley Football Club on Summers Lane, N12. Here those with a mental health condition can socialise with others, engage with their carers and keep healthy in a non-pressured environment.

Manisha has also helped to establish a Disabled Fans Forum there, and continues to follow her belief that football has the power to change lives. It sounds like a New Year's Honour well earned.
