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Sensory garden and playground proposed for new community centre

A proposal has been made for a multi-sensory playground and garden for the new Tarling Road community centre. "The idea is to inspire play and learning through the five senses," said Tolu Faleti from SpaceHive, who are trying to raise £166,000 for the project through crowdfunding.

Councillor Alison Moore said the proposal harked back to one made more than a decade ago in the days of the Old Barn. She added: "It would be fantastic to have a new centre and a new garden flourishing at the heart of our community in a couple of years' time. The crowdfunding concept is a real opportunity to raise money but it will depend on local people getting behind it."

Construction delay affects playground plans

Plans to demolish the Old Barn and replace it with the Tarling Road centre are behind schedule but the council has informed The Archer that construction will finally start in a few months' time and be completed in the autumn of 2018.

SpaceHive cannot plan the garden and playground in any detail until work on the new centre is further forward. One issue is that an organisation to manage the centre has not yet been appointed by the council. SpaceHive is, however, clear that it will not cut down any trees and will make the best possible use of whatever outdoor space is available.

"We look forward to hearing more about the SpaceHive proposal," said a Barnet Council spokesperson. "There are also other funding options available such as the council's grants process."
