

Rooftop flats plan rejected – but building work still goes on By Janet Maitland

A plan to build four flats in the roof space of 127-133 High Road on the corner of Kitchener Road was refused by Barnet Council in October. This is the site that's been covered in scaffolding and draped with plastic for at least a year while a bigger roof has been under construction.

The council turned down the proposal because of inadequate levels of light, outlook and ventilation for future occupants and because there was insufficient information about parking provision. This is unlikely to be the end of the flats proposal, however. Building work is continuing.

The application game

All those living nearby who objected to the flats proposal were concerned not only because they think the bigger roof is a blight on their surroundings but also because they consider the application to be a manipulation of the planning process. This is not, however, how the council sees it, which means that the door is still open for another application with improved designs.

The owner was told by the council in March 2015 that he could not build a fourth storey to accommodate more flats as it would be "out of keeping with other buildings in the area". So he submitted an application later that year to build a bigger roof. The council approved it and work began in 2016. Then in August this year the owner submitted the application to build four flats inside the new roof.

Council's response

We asked the council if adding the flats to the roof would not have been an infringement of the permission to build the roof,

New library

regardless of whether or not the flats had enough light, outlook or ventilation, because their permission to build it had been dependent on there being "no changes to the internal rooms/ spaces of the building".

The council made it clear that they see no irregularity in the application to build flats. "The roof that is under construction is permitted if built in accordance with the approved plans, which proposed to have no changes to the internal rooms of the building," said a spokesperson, adding that the focus of the application was on the use of the extended roof, i.e. the conversion into four flats.

We wanted to ask Atkins Developments, the company constructing the roof, if there was a plan to submit improved designs for the flats, but they did not get back to us.

Building begins on a new children's hospice

Construction has started on Noah's Ark, a new children's hospice building in Byng Road, Barnet, to serve north and central London. The ground-breaking was attended by Samantha Cameron, whose son Ivan died just before his seventh birthday in 2009.
