voting in the General Election?

Barnet Council is facing accusations of a second voting shambles after people were blocked from casting their vote in the General Election when they turned up at polling stations.

Four readers have contacted us directly and we have heard anecdotally of several others who were unable to vote. All had registered online in the weeks leading up to the election and had been told that their registration had been passed to Barnet Council.

No follow-up email

However, it seems none of them received a follow-up email asking them to verify their details by sending in proof of address, passport details and confirmation of their National Insurance number.

This follows problems at last year's Referendum on membership of the European Union, when hundreds of voters were turned away because the wrong electoral lists were sent out to several polling stations, including East Finchley's.

No verification

Maisie Avery and her husband were among those who couldn't vote on 8 June. "When I called to check why my polling card had not arrived, Barnet Electoral office confirmed that while I was registered to vote,

I was not verified," said Maisie. "It's incredibly frustrating. They didn't inform us of the verification process."

Ruth told us: "We only got our votes because I made a fuss at the last moment and sent my passport to the leader of the council, Richard Cornelius. I know others who didn't bother. The council should have been more proactive and done something to deal with everyone who was affected."

No comment

The Archer has been told that a number of students, all of them first-time voters, had missed out on being able to vote for the same reason.

A Barnet Council spokesman told The Archer: "We did not experience any widespread problems with electoral registrations or verification in Barnet. Those queries that were raised were investigated thoroughly and resolved where possible. As is routine in Barnet, we will carry out a review of the General Election process to evaluate

and assess how the process was conducted."

Stories of how we all came to be here

Martin Primary School is leading a lottery-funded community project about migration called Destination East Finchley. It explores how the people of East Finchley have to come to live and work here, and celebrates our multi-cultural community.

The project is already well under way with the setting up of an intergenerational community choir, which sang on the community stage at the East Finchley Festival last month.

In May, Martin Year 6 students also interviewed local community members and business owners about their journeys to London and the area. One local resident said: "I've lived in East Finchley since 1970. I wouldn't live anywhere else. It's very community-based." And another remarked: "The people are friendly here, even strangers."

Festival tent

These interviews were displayed in the Destination East Finchley story-telling tent at the festival. Alongside were artworks on the meaning of 'home' made by pupils at Martin's during Refugee Week and poems they wrote with the help

of performance poet Adisa the Verbaliser.

The tent was a real highlight of the event and many in the local community came to tell their stories about their journeys to East Finchley. Visitors marked their countries of origin on a large map of the world and the UK, and contributed to an evolving exhibition of postcards.

Martin Primary headteacher Rebecca Bakar said: "We are an outward looking community school and this is a wonderful opportunity for us to collaborate with and bring together local organisations, businesses and individuals."
