

# New tower block proposed for heart of East Finchley

A plan has been unveiled to build a new 11-storey block of flats in the heart of East Finchley, creating 42 new homes as part of an initial 320 homes being built for affordable rent for Barnet residents.

Barnet Homes says the proposed block in Prospect Ring will replace four two-storey homes and a garage court in the small estate off Market Place, which already has two tower blocks plus some lowrise housing grouped around a circular green space with several mature trees.

#### Local reactions

The Archer has been con-

tacted by several people living in Prospect Ring who are worried that the new development will increase traffic, noise and pollution, make parking harder, deprive residents of light and privacy, spoil the central green space, and put pressure on local schools and doctors.

"The massive increase in traffic will make life unbearable not only for us, but for the

residents of Market Place and Kitchener Road," said Dermott Donnelly. A resident of one of the existing tower blocks said: "I will lose the much needed natural light and green views for which I bought my flat."

Mark Chapman, chair of governors at nearby Holy Trinity School, said: "We believe that the scale of the building, overlooking and reducing light to our school as it will, is disproportionate, and there will be increased traffic and parking issues."

### Low-rise alternative

One resident suggested a more acceptable alternative would be a new block of three to five floors which would create more affordable housing without being overbearing. We asked Barnet Homes if a low-rise building had been considered and a spokesperson informed us that it had, but as the estate was in a highly built up area with limited space, the high-rise block was the preferred option for consultation.

### **Further consultation**

Approximately 50 people attended the public consultation event on 19 April. "There was mixed feedback," said the Barnet Homes spokesperson. "Some residents were supportive of the principle to build more affordable homes, but there were a number of concerns which will be taken into consideration throughout the design process where possible. There will be another consultation event later in the year before the planning application is submitted."

# Call for new crossing on busy High Road

A petition has been submitted to Barnet Council asking for a new crossing to be installed in East Finchley High Road to prevent pedestrians and shoppers having to "run the gauntlet".

It has been organised by Paul Spencer-Smith, of Lincoln Road, and calls for a new crossing just south of Beresford Road, equidistant between Fortis Green and the existing crossing near Huntingdon Road.

Paul said: "In busy times it is quite difficult to cross the High Road to get to the shops. I live in Lincoln Road so we experience running the gauntlet.

"In crossing from the Budgens and Iceland side a pedestrian looks to see if the Fortis Green lights are red and the flow of vehicles has stopped but there is a curve in the road and visibility is not good.

"The distance between the two existing crossings is approximately 240 metres. This is quite a long way for an older person or a heavily loaded shopper.'

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His petition claims that the provision of a new crossing would relieve the stress to pedestrians crossing, particularly older people, and reduce the risk of accidents. It has been signed by 25 people and will be reported to the Finchley and Golders Green Residents Forum on 5 July. The council will decide whether the request should be formally considered or referred to an area committee for possible funding.
