New tower block redesigned to be thinner but taller

A new tower block proposed for Prospect Ring, N2, (The Archer, June 2017) has been redesigned in the wake of objections from existing residents but the changes have dismayed many of those who live nearby.

The block will now be 13 storeys high, two storeys higher than the original plan, and will have 51 flats where the original proposal stated 42. "It's a case of 'We hear what you say, but we're going ahead anyway'," said unimpressed resident Dermot Donnelly.

We asked Barnet Homes

why they thought the changes were an improvement given that some residents had been concerned that a new tower block would mean a loss of light, views and privacy. A spokesperson said the changed layout of the tower and its distance from existing buildings would ensure privacy, and that

the impact on views would be less because it was narrower.

Residents had also been concerned that an extra tower block would put pressure on local services, increase traffic, cause noise and pollution, and overstretch already limited parking space.

"The objective is to maximise affordable housing in an urban location with good public transport accessibility and services," said the spokesperson, adding that the redesigned plans included "better organised communal areas including new play spaces for children, new planting of shrubs and flowers and additional car parking.'

Planning committee

"It seems they feel that because we already have two ugly high rises already, they can squeeze in another one," one resident told us. Barnet Homes said that although residents' feedback was very helpful, there was a 'mixed reaction' to the proposal, which will be submitted to the planning committee at the end of the year. The planning process allows for nearby local residents to raise objections and to speak at the committee meeting.
