This month all over the country people will be taking part in the annual Memory Walk organised by the Alzheimer's Society. The London event takes place on the morning of Sunday 10 September at the Honourable Artillery Grounds, City Road, EC1, where many who have in some way experienced the effects of this dreadful disease will be using their foot power to fund raise.

Among them once again will be Archer deliverer John Michaeloudis, of Lynmouth Road, N2, who is walking in memory of his mother and close friends. John will be seeking sponsorship by knocking on doors in the locality to ask for support in the form of a cheque made out to the Alzheimer's Society.

Precious memories lost

The message from the Society in its current newsletter is that dementia does not discriminate, with an appeal from former England footballers Gordon Banks OBE and Sir Geoff Hurst. They reveal that fellow team members Ray Wilson, Martin Peters and Nobby Stiles are sufferers and may not now be able to remember that amazing day in

July 1966 when their team won the World Cup.

The ever-increasing number of diagnoses inevitably means more family members finding themselves taking on the role of carer, often a distressing task with little hope at present for the recovery of a loved one. Having been in this position myself 10 years ago, I was attracted to an appeal for volunteers to take part in dementia research.

Research needs volunteers

During that decade I have seen a change for the better with the systems in practice and a modernisation of the methods used. Cognitive tests are taken once a year and recently blood and urine samples (and lumbar punctures if you agree) have been added, in line with the latest theory that they may contain pointers towards the disease.
