



The Archer hits 25 years of neighbourhood news

The first edition of *The Archer* 25 years ago this month was a four-page black-and-white A4 issue, pictured below, which quickly became the essential source of truly local news for East Finchley and soon turned into the 12-page monthly newspaper it still is today. When *The Archer* was born in 1993, East Finchley and the country as a whole was in the thick of a recession. These extracts from an article in our second issue explain the thinking that brought the paper into life... and they are as relevant today as they were 25 years ago.

Local News Is Our Aim

Policing East Finchley

What a dangerous area we live in, no wonder the Insurance Companies treat East Finchley as a high risk area.

Today I attended a press briefing for the first time at Golders Green Police Station given by DO Ron Laveric and Sgt Bernard Forbes. And very hospitable they were too, gave each of us a cup of something hot from the canteen, there wasn't any string hanging out so I believe it was coffee.

Festival to go ahead
Despite Funding Problems
East Finchley Community Festival could lose its grant in 1993 in line with Barnet Borough Council's newly adopted policy on the funding of carnivals and community events.

However the event is planned to go ahead on June 19 next year and, weather permitting, will be successful yet again.

The event was cancelled two years ago. Mocked by the council, who claimed that it had become "political". After an initial court hearing, and subsequent appeal, the festival was cleared of the charges made and awarded costs. Last year the event went ahead on a fine day and many local residents thoroughly enjoyed the day.

If Barnet withdraws its support, organisers will have to make up the £600 awarded last year (of which the council effectively deducted £300 for "indemnity costs").

Bookies Pay Out As Crime Business Booms
Golders Green police warned residents to be extra-vigilant this Christmas as they told of how a branch of William Hill the bookmakers in East Finchley were unwitting hosts to unwelcome punters who had decided to have a gamble last month, and as a result paid out to the tune of £3,220 in cash.

One of an increasing number of local victims of crime, William Hill on the High Road, suffered a forced entry through their front door. Once inside, the perpetrators were able to place the firm's safe onto a trolley and simply wheel it out of the rear entrance, along with its contents.

In the same week, Walters the greengrocer in the High Road had a charity box stolen by "two

Alot of the information was given as background and can't be printed because the people concerned have still to be tried. However I can give you some excerpts and, remember, all this was over one week, not an entire month.

Rape in East Finchley - Trial soon in Harrow
Domestic violence - death may occur - N2
Causton Way, two fifteen year olds were smited at by a fat 60 year old man in a woolly cap who was holding himself with both hands.

Nail Close: Racist telephone calls, RT changed the number
Charity Box stolen by two pimply faced youths from Walters the Green grocer in the High Road.

Angry drunk refused service by Shillipi Indian Restaurant punched and shattered the plate glass window as a farewell gesture.
Sedgemere Avenue N2 - ground floor flat in broken into. TV, video, telephone answering machine, and microwave stolen. Sash window forced.

Dennison Close N2 - ground floor flat broken into, tv, silverware and jewellery stolen. Kitchen window smashed. Front door locked so thieves had to leave by the broken window.

Cornwall Close N2 - Window forced, cash, computer, video camera stolen, forced window for entry whilst owners slept.

Durham Road N2 - Top floor flat broken into, pushed in door, camera's lenses etc stolen to the value of nearly £3,000.

Tait Road N2 - Sub 10 broken into 5.10am, thieves took £100 cash, cigarettes and lighters to value of £100 whilst owners in flat upstairs.

High Road N2 - Andrews the chemist, ground floor window panned below window smashed. Passer by saw pair of legs disappearing inside and called police who turned up within three minutes. Nothing stolen but £100 damage.

Kitchener Road, N2 - Bogus waterboard official stole £200 from unsuspecting pensioner. Home help called police, not caught.

Creighton Avenue N2 - Ashler Court, forced entry by using plimply youths", who also matched the description of youths who attempted to steal a similar charity box from Finchley Wines opposite.

Police also warned the public to check the identity of officials who call at the door after confidence tricksters, posing as Water Board inspectors, gained entry into the home of a Kitchener Road pensioner and made off with £200 cash.

Other crimes in the same week include one rape, a serious assault that could result in death, two cases of indecent behaviour including one towards children, seven burglaries and numerous reports of vandalism, criminal damage, theft and other crimes.

You may be shocked to know that around 4,000 young carers, many of whom are hidden and unacknowledged, are estimated to live in Barnet. A young carer is one who gives regular care and emotional support to a parent, brother, sister or someone else in the family.

This means that a lot of people aged under 18 are looking after someone who cannot manage without their help, a situation which may be detrimental to the young person's own circumstances.

The Archer has produced a souvenir birthday medallion which is kindly being sold for £5 by High Road outlets Aliya J, Black Gull Bookshop, Budgens, Cherry Tree Gift Shop, The Phoenix, Ryker Kids and Tony's Continental plus East End Road's Margot Bakery.

The money raised from this will be donated to Barnet Young Carers. Coincidentally, on 25 January, in the same month as your local community newspaper celebrates its 25th birthday, there is to be a nationwide Young Carers Awareness Day.

Practical local support

Challenges for young carers can include problems with school attendance, poor educational attainment, bullying, social isolation, low self-esteem, feelings of anxiety,

guilt and anger as well as difficulties with health.

Individual support, with mentoring and counselling, is available for all young carers living in the borough, whatever the amount of care they give. It is provided by a specialist Young Carers Support Team and Outreach Officers. They involve the wider family if necessary with a full assessment of everyone's needs and devise plans providing on-going support which is subject to regular reviews.

More support is offered by the Barnet Young Carers and Siblings (BYCAS) project, which includes giving young people the chance to find time to relax away from home with clubs and outings, where they can meet and chat to others. At present approximately 350 youngsters are registered with them.
